Cogheart is an amazing book. From the outset, the characters and the treacherous plots take you on a thrilling, magical journey of adventure and the final twists will leave you spinning.

Set against a backdrop of Victorian streets and glinting airships criss-crossing the skies, mechanical people and animals serve the humans of the world. In a tragic airship accident, a pioneer in the field of these mechanical creations disappears, taking with him a secret that some would kill to know. Only his daughter, Lily and her new friend, Robert, have the key to this secret. However, in their quest to find

answers they are stalked by eerie men with mirrored eyes, who will stop at nothing to get what they want.

Lily Hartman's love of "mechanicals" sets her aside from the other characters, as does her fierce, fiery determination to do what is right. Her friend Robert astounds the reader with his courage. He listens to his father's advice about how it takes a brave heart to win great battles and faces fear after fear to save Lily and the world.

I read this captivating story of secrets and lies, friends and enemies with passion. Peter Bunzl has created a masterpiece: this incredible tale is a work of art, intricately spun. 'Cogheart' will appeal to fans of Philip Pullman's His Dark Materials trilogy.

She hates it when Madame sends the house mechanicals away and when they are collected by mysterious men rather than the cog and bone merchant, Lily suspects that something strange is going on. But why would anyone want her Pap a's old mechanicals? When Robert, the apprentice clockmaker from the next village, arrives with a secret message for Lily they manage to escape from Madame but it seems that they are followed everywhere. They're not even safe with Thaddeus at the clock shop and when Mr. Roach and Mr. Mould come after them they have to go on the run again. Lily has a damaged letter from her Papa which leads them to London to find her godfather, Professor Silverfish, along with Malkin, her clever mechanimal fox, and Anna, a reporter, who they meet at the airship crash site. They should be safe with her godfather but he is not all he seems. He wants her Papa's perpetual motion machine, the Cogheart, and he will go to any lengths to get it. Even murder!

This action packed adventure was so fast paced I found myself holding my breath for some of Lily and Robert's escapes and near misses. Mr. Roach and Mr Mould with the mirrored eyes were really creepy and I loved the mechanicals and mechanimals, especially Malkin. I wish I had a pet like him!
