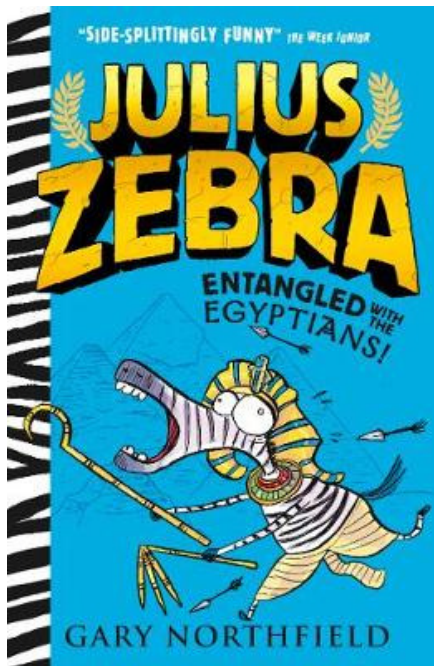


LoveReading4kids Reader reviews of **Julius Zebra:** **Entangled with the Egyptians** by Gary Northfield

The character's quirky turns of phrase and the frequent illustrations had us laughing out loud, as you would expect from an author who has previously contributed to the Beano.

Reading it to my 5 year old I skipped certain words in the frequent name calling between the characters, including 'cretin', but the overall tone of the insults was light hearted and made my 7 year old really chuckle as he read it.
