


# Lovereading4kids Reader reviews of **The Pearl Thief** by Elizabeth Wein

# With a plucky and complex heroine, this is an enjoyable and atmospheric read.

15 year old Lady Julia Beaufort-Stuart returns to her family's ancestral estate in Scotland, not for a relaxing holiday, but to bid goodbye to her home which is to be sold off. Things take a darker turn when Julie is attacked, and the expert who was cataloguing the Murray Hoard is missing, presumed dead. When she awakes from her coma, Julie cannot remember what happened to her. She begins an investigation with the help of Euan McEwen, the Scots Traveller boy who found her when she was injured, and his standoffish yet fascinating sister Ellen. She sees the prejudices her new friends face, as they try to solve the mystery and piece together what happened by the river...

With a plucky and complex heroine, this is an enjoyable and atmospheric read. Elizabeth Wein has established a reputation as a masterful writer of historical fiction, and she evokes 1930s Scotland vividly in this book – both the landscape and the estate. She also deals with prejudice, class and sexuality in a very nuanced way. While I loved Julie, it took me a long time to get into this book and I didn't enjoy it as much as Wein's other books. However, I would recommend it to fans of richly written historical fiction with memorable characters.

The description and language is lovely and detailed, though at times a little tedious.
