




Lovereading Reader reviews of Fierce Kingdom by Gin Phillips

Fierce Kingdom by Gin Phillips, begins in the dying embers of a early autumn







afternoon, with Joan and Lincoln enjoying each other's company, passing the time till dinner with Paul, Father & Husband.

Minutes whizz by and suddenly they find themselves rushing to the Zoo entrance moments before closing time only to find disaster unfolding all around with an armed shooter taking pot shots at animals and people alike, indiscriminately taking lives. Joan's first reaction is to retreat into the safety on the zoo that she and her son know so well. The rest of the action plays out over the following 3 hours until the book reaches it dramatic conclusion.

This book is equally traumatising and captivating, ridiculously tense and incredibly saddening. It makes you question how you might react in the face of death and how far you might go in order to protect the ones you love. An amazing fast paced, exciting read. Highly recommended.

With tense, edge-of-the-seat action from the get-go, my heart was in my mouth the whole time. This packs a real punch.

A perfect afternoon at the zoo morphs into every parent's worst nightmare. Gunmen on an apparently indiscriminate killing spree trap Joan and her young son Lincoln in the zoo and she experiences the sheer terror of coming face to face with a life threatening situation in which each and every decision she makes is critical. She knows the zoo, but not at night. Where can she hide? How can she keep an energetic four-year-old quiet and still? Should she risk moving to find him food or hope that she can avoid his tears brought on by hunger? The sheer terror she is going through as she runs to escape death is palpable. There are other survivors, retired teacher Margaret, teenager Kailynn and a crying newborn but Joan must decide whether helping them could blow her cover and put both Lincoln's and her own life at risk. Can she afford to play the Good Samaritan or are the stakes just too high. Should she help the others or are her basal instincts for self-preservation just too strong? Every decision she makes could be her last.

Spanning just a few hours, this book is short but packs a real punch. Tense, edge-of-the-seat action grips readers from the get-go and it doesn't let up until the closing scene. My heart was in my mouth the whole time and it really made me question just what lengths I would go to to protect my own son. Thought provoking and action packed, a great read.

This is a fairly quick read - the plot covers no more than four hours, and the reader manages to follow it pretty much in real time. Joan is presented as smart, strong, and maternal - and a woman pushed into a scenario many might fear, but few experience: what if...strangers put your child in danger? Lincoln's age is beautifully picked: too small to be independent, but big enough to engage in conversations, to form a genuine character. Anybody who has had lengthy conversations with four-year-olds will recognise Lincoln.

Ultimately this is the story of the lioness protecting her cub - against all odds and finding a strength both physically and mentally that she has never tested before.

This is **one of the most gripping, thrilling and downright scary stories** *I have read in a long time.* The 'action' all takes place across a period of less than four hours but the tension and atmosphere make this seem much much longer.

It all starts out so innocently with Joan taking her son Lincoln to the zoo. She does this regularly and they are playing as usual deep in their special place -the Dinosaur Pit. Lincoln is making up exotic stories based on Thor and the Nordic gods. Joan is only half listening as she contemplates the minutiae of her life. They are happy and it is time to go - the zoo is about to close for the day.

At first the noises they hear as they make their way to the gate seem unreal and disconnected until Joan slowly realises that they are in grave danger - pursued and hunted by an unknown stalker or stalkers.

Immediately Joan's behaviour changes as she strives desperately to protect her son from the menace around them and get him to safety. Others move in and







out of the picture but ultimately this is the story of the lioness protecting her cub - against all odds and finding a strength both physically and mentally that she has never tested before.

Could have been a compelling read – the extremes a mother would go to protect her 4 year old son – but wide of the mark with the plot.

Joan and her 4 year old Lincoln, are playing in the forests found within the grounds of their local zoo (the City is not named but it is obviously somewhere in the US). A favourite location for them both. He because he gets the full focus of his Mum to create his stories with his toys as the actors. And she because these are special moments when there is only her and him – no distractions and fully appreciating these moments are not ones she will always have access to her only child.

When she realises the time she fast tracks Lincoln to the exit expecting at worse to have to have the zoo keepers open up the locked gates at the end of their day but what she actually sees are the results of what looks to be a massacre. Bodies lay strewn – dead, injured or just lying still in the hope of not being seen.

The story then focuses on Joan and Lincoln over the 3 hours trying to keep hidden from the gunmen and survive the ordeal.

Phillips does well in building the love a Mum has for her child and the absolute unconditional protection she will offer to protect him from the bad in the world. What I felt to be lacking credibility was the story setting. Just could not buy into the plot which include them hiding in a porcupine enclosure, bumping into one of the gunman and being allowed to walk away, throwing away her phone to distract the stalkers. Just seemed wholly unrealistic and thus deflected from what could have been a very powerful mother-child relationship story.
