



Hitchcock has been called the 'Master of suspense' but in the written format, that title goes to Ali Land – a remarkable psychological suspense author.

The story focuses on the aftermath of 15 year old Annie finally escaping her home to reveal the truth of her childhood to the Police - that her Mum is a serial killer, made worse by the fact that her victims are 4, 5, 6 year olds.

Ahead of the trial Annie is living with foster carer, Mike and his wife and daughter Phoebe. Despite the trauma of her 15 year life, things are no more easy now she has escaped. Her Mum invades her thinking

and at times, Annie (now called Millie to protect her from the mass attention) feels at times that she is being controlled now as much as she did when they lived together. And then there is Phoebe, ruthless in her bullying of Millie both at home and school where her popularity triggers others to join her in the constant attack.

As Millie counts down the days to the trial where she will need to be witness, her confidence in her decision to report her Mum ever diminishes. Does she herself have something to hide that she may reveal when under duress? What really was her role in the death of the children – was she at all complicit? Can she ignore the voices in her head and avoid her Mum winning even at the very last?

One of those books which you want to rush to get to the answer yet never want to finish. Remarkable writing which generates an incredible sense of willing

Annie to get through her ordeal and find out that the future can be a positive one.

Becoming a serial killer doesn't happen overnight, so what Ali Land has managed to do with the years of abuse suffered by the fifteen-year old daughter of her serial killer mother is just breath-taking.

A good psychological thriller, with a gripping and intriguing story line - an author to look out for.

This is Ali Land's debut novel and I think it's safe to say it is going to be a hit and I already look forward to her future books.

'Good Me, Bad Me' is about a deeply psychologically damaged girl Annie, whose mother is a child serial killer. Annie spent her childhood witnessing her mother's horrendous actions and was the only one that could stop her by handing her into the police.

Annie takes on the new identity of Milly and sent to live with a foster family, her foster dad Mike is a psychologist who is to help her through her mother's court case. After Annie shops her serial killer mother to the police, she is placed into foster care with her psychologist and given a new identity. She starts a new school as 'Milly' and is bullied by the other girls, especially Phoebe the daughter of her foster family. Milly is also haunted by her mother, the children she killed and her own guilt at grassing up her mum. As the trial looms, Milly's behaviour becomes more erratic accumulating in a tragic event.

This is a unique story told purely from Milly's point of view. There are some flashbacks to the time of the killings and Annie's reasoning behind her decision to report her mum to the police. Milly's obsession with her art teacher and her unconventional friendship with Morgan lead to you feeling her vulnerability and loss of childhood. However, there is a much darker edge to the story and as much as you sympathise with Milly, her thoughts and actions are equally scary.

Well, this is quite something. Land's debut is explosive, compelling, and intelligent, and is set to be one of the psychological thrillers of 2017.

Annie's mother is a serial killer, torturing and murdering nine children in her care. Annie knows this, because it was her who turned her mother into the police, telling them almost everything what was happening in their house. When she is given a new name, Milly, and sent to live with a foster family, she tries to move on and prepare for testifying against her mother at the trial, but there are some things that you just can't outrun, and blood maybe one of them...

Ali Land has written a fantastic debut novel. Milly is, by turns, vulnerable, sympathetic, insinuating, manipulating, and terrifying; both younger than her

age, and far older and more experienced than a teenager should ever have to be. The violence and horrendous nature of her mother's actions are hinted at, rather than fully revealed, which only adds to the creeping sense of horror that pervades the narrative. If you like psychological thrillers that are intelligent and beautifully-written, you'll love this.

Millie tells us her story, how she has come to be fostered by her psychiatrist and his family, how she told the authorities about her abusive, child abducting, murdering mother, who has forced her to participate in torture and abuse that is never described but frequently alluded to. The trial is approaching and she is being counselled in preparation for the trauma of reliving the horror she has witnessed as an innocent bystander

She comes across to us, the reader, as a sincere victim, who has been exposed to much more than any young teenager should. She seems misunderstood and underestimated by her foster family, and demonstrates a level of manipulation that eventually begins to ring alarm bells though we are not quite sure why.....until the end, which I won't spoil for you, but which warranted a swift second reading to make sure I had read correctly!

*Well written, from the girl's perspective, we need to keep in mind her upbringing and her parental role model to understand who she is and why she is that way. **Enthralling and engaging, I defy anyone not to finish it.***

This fresh voice, from a prospectively interesting though menacing character could easily be developed thru further novels.....I look forward to reading them.
