Q&A with Joel Stewart

Is there a particular book, author, or film that had a particular impact on you in your childhood?

Maurice Sendak's Where the Wild Things are, and Tove Jansson's Comet in Moominland had a huge and lasting impact on my imagination and still a clear influence to this day. There was also a collection of Italian folktales edited by Italo Calvino that my dad read to me when I was really quite little that I think was very important.

What did you enjoy most at school?

I loved to draw! But interestingly one of the people to encourage me the most in this, and to push me to draw my own way, was a Physics teacher.

What is your earliest memory?

I'm not sure. I remember being awed by a complicated adventure playground type structure, that a teenager built himself out of scrap wood at the commune, (I think it included a skateboard ramp though my memory might be combining something the same person built elsewhere). It was hugely dangerous and brilliant. It was known as The Construction.

Is there a particular holiday destination that you have visited that you would love to return to?

I have been a festival of Luthiers (musical instrument makers) and Dance in the centre of France a number of times over my lifetime. I'd like to make it back there again at least once. Perhaps even with some instruments that I have made.

Is there anything you'd like to tell us about your pets, past or present?

My mother had a B&W Collie Spaniel dog named Cuillean (Gaelic for puppy) which appears in a few of my picture books. I've had lots of cats too, but now I can't because I found out that they make me sneeze! For some reason I've always had aquariums full of weird and wonderful fish around the house too.
