Oxford – I was born here and have never lived anywhere else. Not just because I'm surrounded by family, but I love Oxford buildings, trees, authors, museums, and The Cake Shop in the Covered Market.

What are your hobbies?

Star-gazing, photography, and woodland walks.

I was awarded a Highly Commended medal for my cha-cha-cha at the age of 10

I once had a letter published in Smash Hits magazine

I played the part of 'cave wall' in the school panto Aladdin

When did you first start to write/illustrate stories?

I filled my school rough books with stories through primary school, and when Mrs Braybrook taught us how to bind our own books, I turned them all into hardbacks for my poor sister to read.

Where did your idea for this story come from?

My sons. As soon as they started to talk, I realised they were hilarious, so I wrote down all the things they said and did.

What made you write this book?

Stan and Fred begged me to write about them. Well, that's what it felt like in my head. They were originally part of another story, but they wanted one all of their very own.

What have you enjoyed most about working on this book?

Creating Stan's charts, and thinking up naughty things for Fred to get up to.
