

Pavel (Pav as he is called) and his family have moved to Little Town from neighbouring Old Country. The friendship between the two boys is tested many times, especially when the discrimination against Pav starts. Everyone is very repressed in Little Town and there are many rules to obey. The people there resent Old Country refugees. Charlie's parents worry about the friendship and even Charlie questions it to himself but he proves to be a true friend. Pav's attempts to speak the Little Town dialect are quite funny. When Old Country invade Little Town and the bombs fall one night, the boys are caught up in a war zone and everything changes. All sorts of trouble happens when Charlie starts to break some of the rules, driven more and more by his mother's increasingly desperate need for medicine. This book really did make me think about what it would be like as a child living through a conflict and not being

able to do or say the things you want.
