
Lovereading Reader reviews of One Step Too Far by Tina Seskis

A very, very cleverly written book with a perfectly executed twist. 'One Step Too Far' is an extremely well written, enthralling read.

A very, very cleverly written book. 'One Step Too Far' effortlessly drew me in to the life of Emily Coleman. From the very first page I wanted to know more about her. What was she running from and why? Emily seems to fall into her new life by accident and it goes on to develop in a haphazard fashion. Her chance encounter with Angel becomes a close friendship. Given what we know about Emily's character, their bond seems unlikely at first but the two women support each other which is exactly what each of them needs. Emily's new life, alone in a strange city, progresses. She finds a comfortable home and a job she's good at. She almost seems to be holding it together until events and fate conspire against her and her past comes crashing back into the present.



The twist in the plot, the point at which the readers eyes are finally opened to the truth of Emily's past, could not have come as more of a shock to me. Wow! It literally left me with my mouth hanging open. It was absolutely perfectly executed. Tina Seskis has done a fantastic job. Extremely well written, this is an enthralling read.

Such a gripping plot. Seskis holds you with glimpses into the past that tempt and tease you; culminating into an emotional rollercoaster of an ending.

This book gripped me from the first to the last page. As expected, the plot was more than just the story of a bored housewife leaving home. Seskis cleverly dips into Emily's, the main character, history; drawing you into the emotional turmoil of her life and teasing you with endless possibilities that hint at the explanation for Emily's departure. Each character is beautifully and thoughtfully presented; exploring their personality flaws and examining their importance to the story. Central to the plot is the sweetness of the love story between Emily and her husband. A normal relationship amidst darkness. At times I felt anxious, almost desperate to know that it was all going to turn out okay. Seskis' descriptions pull you into the story. (I swear I could smell the horrendous odours of the shared house!) The glimpses into her past are then expertly gathered together, culminating into an emotional rollercoaster of an ending. There will be much debate on the satisfaction of the ending but I thought it was utterly brilliant. My only criticism is the scene that starts the big reveal. A footballer? Really? Not required or relevant, in my view.

I'll come clean right from the off; I thought this book was superb.

Contemporary stories about relationships, especially those from a female viewpoint, do not usually appeal to me but I was hooked from the initial few pages of this gripping read. The writing style and pace of the story seemed, for me at least, to be a perfect fit with the characters we meet.

Emily/Cat is an interesting and intriguing character. I liked her very much and I wanted to know more about her; why is she leaving her life and family to start anew in London? What has happened to her to lead to such an upheaval?

The story is told predominantly from Emily's viewpoint, both in the current and the past, and we also get snapshots from other characters' lives as they intersect with Emily. This helps to build up our understanding of Emily but also adds different layers to the initial conundrum of why has she started her life anew.

The storyline develops magnificently and kept this reader guessing as to the

reasons behind Emily's life changing decisions. And the revelation, when it occurred, was a genuine "Wow" moment for me.

I liked Emily and rooted for her throughout. I will also keep an eye out for more from debut novelist Tina Seskis. Loved it!

This book makes the reader ask 'why?' many times. It is only at the end, when the answer is presented to us, that we can really understand what we've been reading.

I wholly agree with the reviewer who said this book was reminiscent of 'Sixth Sense' in terms of the twist in the tale, a twist which readers will berate themselves for not seeing. After Emily leaves home for London, and her behaviour begins to change dramatically for the worse, the reader will wonder at it, but the revelation at the end made this behaviour seem inevitable, and completely understandable.

The story is not told in a linear way, which serves to build up the suspense. The first voice we hear is in the present tense and is that of the protagonist, Emily, who recounts what is happening to her at that precise moment. This alternates with the narrator's voice, which gives us the back story, told in the past tense. There is a clear difference in these voices. Emily's is emotional, very descriptive and in places the prose is striking. In contrast, the narrator's voice is quite flat and almost monotonous, as if imparting mere facts and, because of this, it sometimes feels less like a novel and more like a report. It is up to Emily to furnish the signs of anger, despair, hope and rage so that the reader truly feels with her.

If at times the story is redolent of a modern-day fairy tale for women, with a glamorous job, expensive clothes, and rich boyfriends thrown into the mix, this is a slight quibble. The book held my attention the whole way.
